BACCALAUREATE SPEECH GRADUATION 2022

This development would not be possible without our formative experiences at Archbishop Murphy High School. But I want to take a moment to recognize how we've had significant experiences through our classes such as the life lessons we will never forget, the meaningful conversations we truly felt a part of, the higher morals we have been called to, and the rigorous course load. I'm not just talking about staying up late working on projects or taking one of Mrs. Alkire's tests, when you had no clue how you would do. It's bigger than that!

We, along with our teachers, have invested countless hours into our education, and rather than simply doing all of this for myself,



I have realized the importance of devoting my time and effort with the intent of doing it for God, to glorify him, because I know God gives us opportunities every day so we can learn, grow, and enhance our capabilities to serve God and humanity both now and being equipped to do so in the future. All along, God has been guiding us through our time at AMHS to persevere through challenges and discover the gifts, interests, and talents he has given us.

KATHY ALKIRE

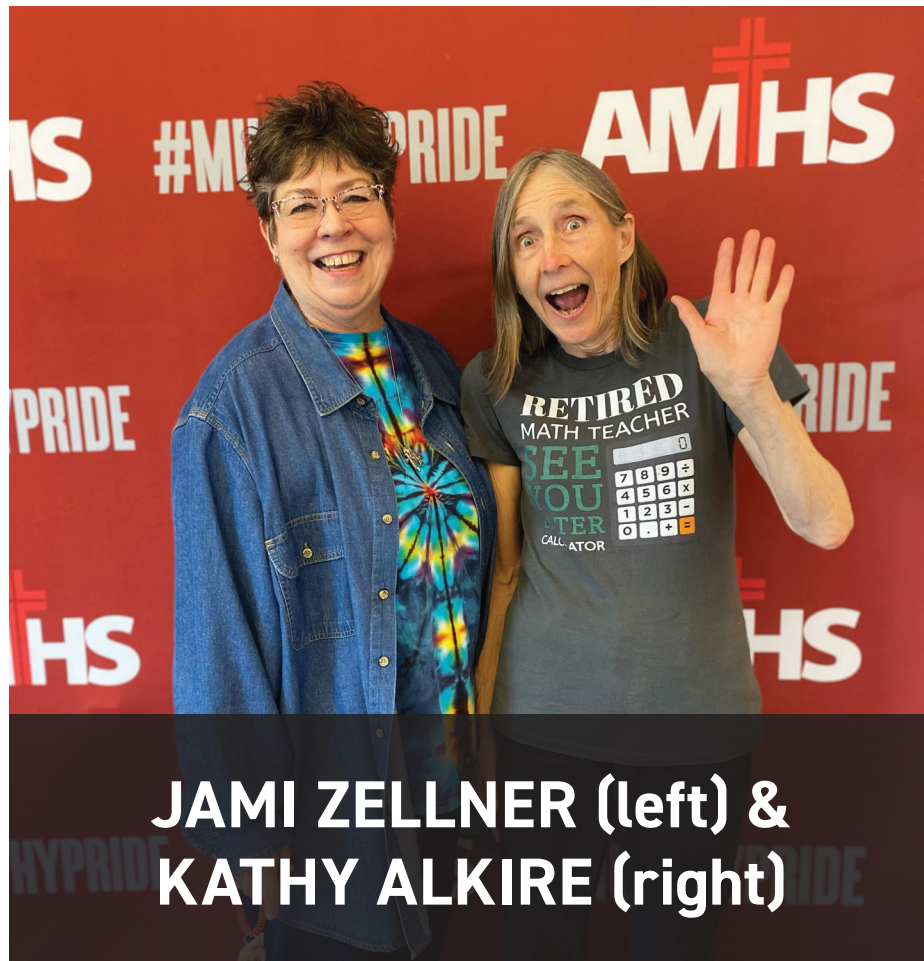
Kathy was the last remaining faculty member from Holy Cross High School—she started at Holy Cross in 1996. She was a member of both the Math and Science departments and the moderator of the Math Team. Kathy and her husband Vince (who served as the IT Director

at AMHS for many years) were the proud parents of two Holy Cross and AMHS graduates (Thomas '99 and Steven '04). As we celebrated Kathy and her retirement at our end of year luncheon, her friend and colleague Beth Mock shared the following reflection:

In the beginning, 21 years ago...

There was no Grace Hall, or Heath Hall, just Old Main and the portables. There were three people in the Math department, me, Jerry Zander, and Kathy Alkire who was our department chair. We took attendance on paper—Cathy Meehan walked around and picked it up from every classroom. We ate lunch in the gym—Dave Elkins had to lay out tarps every day, put the tables on them, and clean it all up afterwards. Kathy taught math and physics, coached track with her dad, who everyone called Grampa. Her son Steve was one of her students who went on to earn his doctorate in physics and is now teaching at Blanchet.

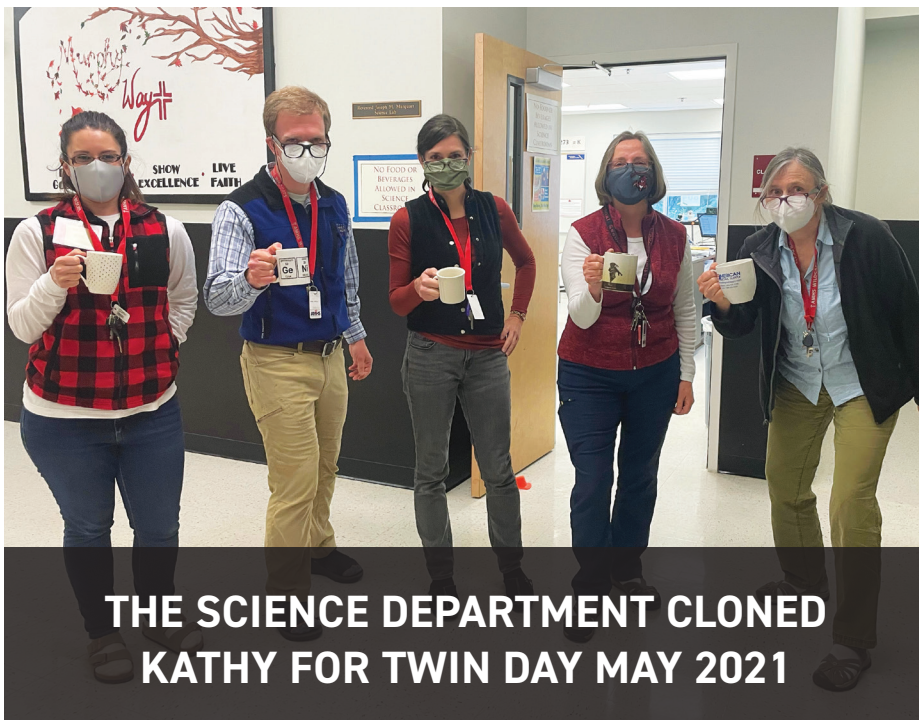
Over the years Kathy has given 100% of her energy and attention to her students (I'd say 110%, but as math teachers, we know that's not a real thing). Did you know that she personalizes her tests to include her student's names? Did you know that she went back to college to brush up on multivariable or differential calculus, when we had a student who showed up and was ready for Calc BC as a

freshman? Did you know that she taught classes she was not paid for many times, just because there was a handful of students who needed that class?

She is best known for leaving trails of coffee in the hallway, because she's always in a hurry to get back to her class. She showed up one day to school with a black eye, and we all figured that she had been moving too fast at home and ran into a door.

Her students know her to use the word, “Piffle” when she thinks something is nonsense. She is known to shake with excitement when she gets to the end of a proof. She used to be known for jumping up on tables to demonstrate a point (I don’t know if she does that anymore?).

She and her husband will go down in AMHS history for giving one of the funniest performances ever in an all-school assembly. The ASB kids were trying to teach the entire school how to behave at school dances. They had several couples showing how to dance appropriately, keeping distance and their hands to themselves, and then there was Vince and Kathy Alkire demonstrating what not to do. It was hysterical and made all of the kids uncomfortable (It was great!).

Personally, I will be forever grateful for all the time and attention she gave to my children, especially my son, Robert. She was there to give my son the intellectual stimulation he needed to stay engaged in school. She was there when he had questions that were outside of the stated curriculum, they explored many ideas together with a pen and a whiteboard (Euler’s Theorem $e^{i\pi} = -1 + 2\pi ni$). He has fond memories of math team competitions – he’s still mad about the one they should have won, when they used ALL the data, not just a sample (I am also grateful for Vince’s efforts in teaching Robert about programming. Vince gave him a book on Python when he was in 8th grade, and he read it and learned how to program.).

Robert said, “She gave me faith in the believability of the world. Once you’ve learned differential equations, you can model anything.” When we moved into Heath Hall, and I asked for as many white boards as I could get, I was offered the old white boards from the front of Kathy Alkire’s old room. It felt like an honor to have them in my room.

Celebrating OUR STUDENTS

DECA: AMHS DECA had a successful 2021-2022 school year! The success started with recruiting 57 members, 41 of whom competed at the Area 2 Competition at the Lynnwood Convention Center in January. From there, 26 members qualified for the WA DECA State Career Development Conference (SCDC) and traveled to Bellevue, WA for a three-day field trip in March. AMHS DECA had not attended the state conference since 2019, so the members thoroughly enjoyed staying overnight at the Hilton Bellevue, competing in-person at the Meydenbauer Center, and networking with students from high schools all over the state. One student, Blake Coleman ('22), qualified for the International Career Development Conference (ICDC) in his event: Quick Serve Restaurant Management.

In early 2022, AMHS DECA was honored to receive Gold Recertification for its School-Based Enterprise (SBE), The Murph. This meant that the student store met all of DECA Inc.'s 2021-22 SBE recertification guidelines and two AMHS DECA leaders -Elizabeth Damitio ('22) and Nicole Alvarez ('23) - had the opportunity to present the SBE to judges at the international level. In April, Ms. Hall traveled with Blake, Elizabeth, and Nicole to Atlanta, Georgia for ICDC. The group enjoyed presenting to judges, networking with other DECA members, attending workshops, and touring the city of Atlanta.

Moreover, The Murph - which is AMHS DECA's SBE and student store - had a fantastic year. From regular lunch sales to monthly specials, net sales soared over \$20,000 for the school year. Thanks to the store's many customers, The Murph completed over 5,000 transactions. AMHS DECA is thankful for its student workers and its loyal customers, both which help keep the store running successfully.

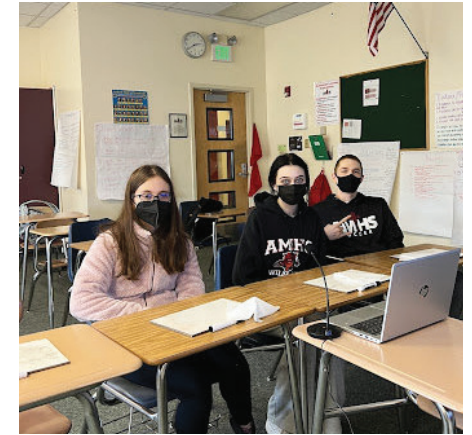
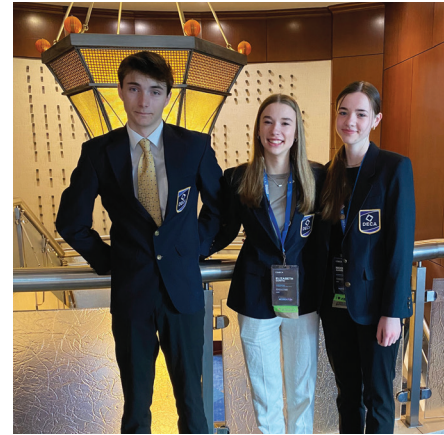
HI-Q: The Hi-Q team, led by seniors Anthony Veneziani, Kira Schwetz, Alina Lewandowski, Matthias Bolton, and freshman Zoe Brewer, reached the state semifinals match in the 2021-2022 season. The team improved its score in each match in which they competed and represented the school honorably. Team strengths included Current Events, Shakespeare, Geography, and Physics. Hi-Q is an academic trivia competition in which students answer questions from a broad variety of preselected texts in a range of academic subjects. Three teams compete against each other in a fast-paced format.

KNOWLEDGE BOWL: Our Knowledge Bowl team focused on building up the team this year and establishing the tone for the years to come with the help of new and returning members! Some of our new members even competed for their first time in the Knowledge Bowl circuit at the competition at Jackson High School. We're looking forward to continuing our momentum and competing at more events for the 2022-2023 season.



MOCK TRIAL: The Archbishop Murphy Varsity Mock Trial Team, coached by Skagit County Prosecuting Attorney Jennifer Flynn, finished in 3rd place in the Snohomish County District Meet, held in February of 2022. 24 students competed on two different teams at the District Meet. The following students were nominated for Best Witness: Ava Jobe, Chloe Hogue, Taylor Nilson, Andrew Davenport, and Philip Wold. Taylor Nilson won the award for Best Witness in the District. The following students were nominated for Best Attorney: Ashlie Latta, Trevor Abramson, Sophie St. Jacques, Troy Slocum, and Taylor Nilson. Sophie St. Jacques won the award for Best Attorney in the District.

Based on the finish at Districts, 14 varsity students qualified for the Washington State Meet, held in March of 2022. This marks the 17th consecutive year AMHS has qualified for the Stat Meet, which is the 4th longest streak in the history of the high school mock trial competition in Washington! The following students garnered recognition for Best Witness at the State Meet: Ava Jobe and Philip Wold. Best Lawyer awards were earned by Makena Schick, Troy Slocum, and Sophie St. Jacques.



THE SHOW MUST GO ON**BY ALICIA MITCHELL, AMHS PRINCIPAL**

The AMHS production of Disney's *High School Musical* in late February 2022 marked our full return to live theater following the disruption caused by the pandemic. It was our first live musical since our scheduled performances of *Bright Star* unfortunately halted mid-way through production in March 2020. At that time, our return to the stage was uncertain, but the AMHS students and performing arts staff were determined to keep the arts alive despite enormous challenges and restrictions over the past few years.

Senior Annie Emans, who also played Lucy in *Bright Star*, might have captured it best when she said, "As someone who has been doing theater for most of my life, I was excited to perform live again. I hadn't performed on stage since 2020, and a part of me worried that live theater would never make a comeback. It made this year's musical so important to me and the rest of the cast and crew. I had also grown up as a lover of High School Musical, and was thrilled to bring my favorite character, Sharpay, to life on stage."

Leading up to Disney's *High School Musical*, our students and staff demonstrated incredible creativity and resolve in finding ways to work within pandemic guidelines over the past few years. This included exploring new media, such as film, and finding storylines that allowed for masking and social distancing. Julia Hawkins and Adriana Hilero (Class of 2022) alongside Brent Stainer, even wrote and produced two feature length films – *Love at First Zoom* and the following year *Bridgehurst Asylum for the Sane*, which was picked up by a national distributor. Another student, Elliott Montoya even wrote the musical score for *Love at First Zoom*.

Our students learned valuable new skills from this venture into film and have even continued with the production of a third

film, *Varsity Squad*, which is currently in the works. Keith Curtis, AMHS Band Director and ASB / Leadership teacher, commented that filming a movie was "at first our only option and then we got a taste for it and found that it allowed new opportunities for students." He appreciated that film allowed a broader range of students to participate because the schedule was more flexible and included a number of smaller parts too, giving more students an opportunity to be part of the production. Brent Stainer, who has written and directed AMHS productions for years, added that "we had students who never acted before in the film!"

With each accomplishment, from returning to band performances at sporting events, concerts on campus, and even the living Stations of the Cross on Good Friday, our student artists gained confidence in returning to the stage despite continued challenges of live theater in a pandemic. As Keith Curtis explained, "there is just no substitute for that exchange of energy they produce and the audience response back...an ideal scenario is a perfect cycle. It builds character."

This increased confidence was also observed by our Arts Department Chair and Choir Director, Carrie Wright, throughout the production of Disney's *High School Musical*:

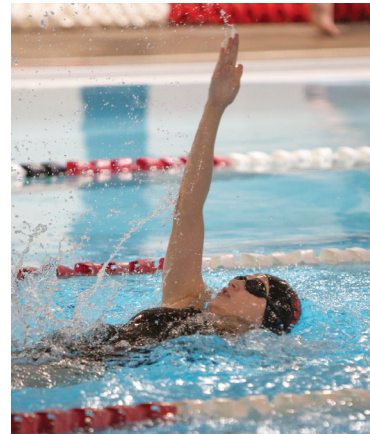
and commitment it took to return to the stage this past school year. Due to the pandemic, we moved our production to the Wagner Theater for the first time. Being in a new venue came with unanticipated technical challenges. Band Director Keith Curtis felt that the unfamiliar venue ultimately contributed to being more creative and attuned to sound engineering and design. The production quality did not go unnoticed either. Our student orchestra was even recognized among the 2021-2022 Fifth Avenue Theater 20th Anniversary high school musical award recipients for Disney's *High School Musical*.

The pandemic itself, however, still posed the greatest challenge. Stage Manager, Julia Hawkins ('22) remarked that the most nerve racking concern was COVID itself, as they were all acutely aware it was a true possibility that illness "could have a massive ripple effect on everyone." Our performers tested frequently, rehearsed in masks, and exercised caution in an effort to prevent illness among the cast and crew. Fortunately, our cast and crew remained healthy and the show was a huge success!

AMHS is blessed to have a thriving Fine Arts program, which has immeasurable value beyond the classroom and stage. As Annie

Emans ('23) shared, theater at AMHS "welcomes people from all different skill levels. At the end of the day, theater is not about how talented you are, it's about learning new things, making friends, and having fun. Even if you dislike performing, there are so many opportunities to work behind the scenes, and you can be involved in stage crew, costume design, and more! By being involved in theater, you can discover new interests, passions, and talents that you didn't even know you had." Recent graduate Julia Hawkins ('22) shared a similar passion for Fine Arts programming in schools; saying, "it gives students an opportunity to experience something genuine and irreplaceable." Julia also added that theater is "a different form of self-expression that has the ability to ignite a spark in a student's life and open their eyes to all the Fine Arts has to offer."

BAND: The band program had a banner year--providing spirited sound to football games and assemblies, hitting high marks in concert performances with our counterparts in the Performing Arts, and our pit players in the Musical being recognized by the Fifth Avenue Awards. Through every season, from summer Band Camp all the way to Graduation Day, band students showed excellent personal and musical growth over the year, as individuals and as an ensemble.

CARLSON FAMILY ENDOWMENT

The Carlson Family Endowment was founded by Lon and Joan Carlson. This endowment provides financial aid to female students who are involved in a variety of school activities. Lon and Joan's children, Megan '10 and Beth '13, are AMHS alumni.

DEMERS ENDOWMENT

Don and Millie DeMers believed in Catholic education. After hearing about AMHS from a friend, they graciously established an endowment and included AMHS in their estate plans. EBERLE ENDOWMENT

Michael and Cecile Eberle were residents of Everett, WA for over 70 years. They were fixtures in the community. Mike and Cecile left a lasting impact on AMHS by creating this endowment in 2000 to support the AMHS athletics program.

Although Mike and Cecile are no longer with us, their legacy lives on through their six children, 13 grandchildren, and growing group of great-grandchildren— many of whom have chosen an AMHS education.

TERRY ENNIS ENDOWMENT

The Terry Ennis Memorial Endowment Fund was founded by the AMHS Board of Trustees in June of 2008 to honor our late coach, teacher, mentor, and friend.

Terry's love for nurturing young student-athletes changed the lives of thousands of athletes, peers, and friends. The Ennis family, in conjunction with the AMHS leadership, annually choose recipients of the proceeds from the fund who would not otherwise be able to afford an AMHS education.

MARY HENDERSON ENDOWMENT

Mary Henderson and her husband Dick dreamed of a Catholic high school in Snohomish County. In the early 1980s they helped this dream become a reality. Alongside the other "kitchen table" families, Mary and Dick founded Holy Cross High School which opened in 1988. In 1999 the school was renamed in honor of Archbishop Thomas J. Murphy and moved to the current campus in south Everett. Throughout the entire history of the school, Mary and Dick have been active leaders in the community, attending events, serving in board positions, and supporting school programs. They were blessed to send three grandchildren to the school—Brady '16, Ryan '17, and Max '19.

The Mary Henderson endowment was founded to honor the memory of Mary and provide a tuition award each year to an AMHS student.

HOLY CROSS ENDOWMENT

One spring evening in 1981, a couple of families gathered around a kitchen table to discuss the possibility of a Catholic high school in Snohomish County. The reality that it might be too late for their own children to attend this school didn't deter them. Soon, dozens of local families partnered with them, and the Northsound Association for Catholic Education was formed, and board members were selected.

This endowment was created as a way to honor the beginning of AMHS, Holy Cross High School. The Holy Cross Endowment fund supports the continuing Catholic education of Latino students who matriculate from our partner parish schools.

JOHN MARTENS ENDOWMENT

The John Martens Endowment was founded by fellow Holy Cross alumni of the late John Joseph Martens IV, class of 1996, to honor his life cut far too short.

This merit-based scholarship is awarded to a minimum of one qualifying student per year in his memory. The student selected demonstrates high acumen in the areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and/or Math.

ROMAN MILLER ENDOWMENT

Roman Miller spent his life in Catholic schools, from his early childhood at St. Alphonsus Parish School in Ballard, to his high school years at O'Dea, and college at Seattle University. Following his service in the Army Air Force during WWII (where he was assigned to the Manhattan Project) Roman attended Seattle University and later worked in their athletic office.

Roman was a high school teacher and coach at O'Dea before embarking on a career which included political advising, serving as the executive director of the Washington State horse racing commission, and scouting for the Houston Colt .45s Major League Baseball team.

Roman Miller has served as an athletic adviser and board member at AMHS for over 15 years. In 2009, the school named the baseball field Roman Miller Field in his honor. This endowment was created by AMHS as a way to honor our longtime friend, colleague, and mentor.

MURPHY SCHOLARS ENDOWMENT

Bart and Carolyn Murphy established a scholarship program in the memory of Bart's brother, Archbishop Thomas J. Murphy. The recipients of these awards are recognized by the high school as Murphy Family Scholars. Priority in the selection of Murphy Family Scholars is given to students who have a strong academic record, demonstrate financial need, and express a

commitment to continue to complete the sacramental process of initiation through confirmation.

NUESSENDORFER SCHOLARSHIP

Motivated by a desire to recognize his parents' commitment to their children's education and the Catholic faith, Roland and Josephine Neussendorfer's son, Joseph, started this scholarship in their honor in 2000.

Roland and Josephine demonstrated their Catholic faith through prayer, stewardship and unfaltering trust in God. When their children were in high school, Roland was laid off from his job after 29 years. Despite this setback, they never wavered from their goal to pay for their children's college education. During those difficult times, they were steadfast in their prayers and made sacrifices to ensure their son and daughter would go to college.

Years after leaving college, Joseph recognized that much of his career success was attributable to the college education generously financed by his parents. As a tribute, Joseph Neussendorfer established scholarships in his parents' name to thank them for these lifelong gifts and to support the educational goals of Catholic teens.

MARDY PASCHKE SCHOOL SERVICE (LINK) SCHOLARSHIP

Jane Brown, long time counselor at AMHS established a fund in memory of her late mother, Mardy "Grandma Cookie" Paschke. Mardy lived 86 blessed years in Everett until her death in September 2011 after fighting a courageous battle with cancer. Mardy graduated from Everett High School and earned a BA in Business Administration from the University of Washington. Her passion and career led her to the travel industry where she worked for over 47 years.

The Mardy Paschke School Service (LINK) Scholarship is presented to a graduating senior who has shown outstanding service to the AMHS community and is a participant in LINK. The LINK program was started in 2005 through her daughter Jane, who was very passionate about its success. LINK is the orientation program encouraging community and camaraderie amongst students prior to the first day of school. LINK establishes mentor relationships between seniors and freshmen. Mardy helped raise money for the program, by selling delicious cookies during lunches. It is here where she established relationships with students, faculty and parents.

SIMMONS FAMILY ENDOWMENT

Preston and Jill Simmons are models of giving back to the community, not only for all of the expertise and volunteer hours they have poured into AMHS, but in the Greater Snohomish County region.

Preston and Jill Simmons started the Simmons Family Endowment to support student access to an AMHS education. They witnessed first-hand the impact of an AMHS education through the experience of their two sons, PJ '12 and Connor '14.

CHET WILKERSON ENDOWMENT

Cheston Wilkerson was Salutatorian as well as ASB President of Holy Cross High School's first graduating class in Everett. He earned an A.A. from Edmonds Community College and attended the University of Washington, Reed College and Seattle University. Chet was an avid skier and racer and was owner/director of Sno-Cap Ski School at Stevens Pass. Chet loved sports and created and produced music. He was an avid fan of the Seattle Thunderbirds, UW Huskies, Nascar Racing, and Hydro Racing.

Chet passed away in March 2003. This endowment was founded to honor all that he gave to this school as its first official student leader. Each year a scholarship is given to a current junior in his honor who demonstrates superior leadership qualities.

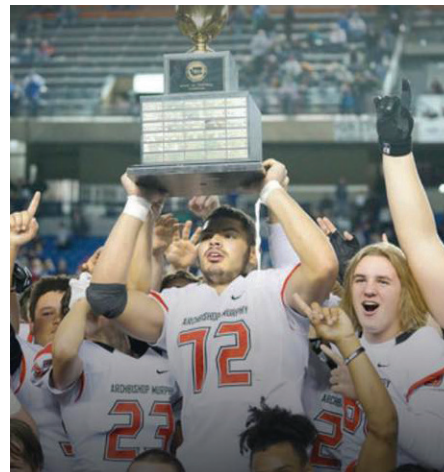

Reflection shared by her brother,
Tim Doyle:

Jenny was born in 1980 in Norfolk, VA. Her mom Christie was an elementary school teacher and her dad Dennis was a career Naval Officer. She had two older brothers, Patrick and Tim. Most of her elementary, middle, and high school years were spent in Seattle, Mukilteo, and Snohomish, WA.

She loved sports, skiing, animals, and was active in 4-H, where she rode and showed horses.

Jenny attended Holy Cross High School and was a very successful student-athlete. She was Salutatorian of her graduating class in 1999 and a member of the National Honor Society. She lettered in varsity basketball and soccer all four years along with two years in track and field. She was team captain of the girls soccer and basketball teams her senior year. Her junior year they finished second in state in soccer.

After graduation, she attended the University of San Diego on a Navy ROTC scholarship, where she studied Biology. She graduated as the top Navy Midshipman in her class, and selected aviation as

her career track in the Navy. While in Navy flight school, Jenny met her future husband, Ramon Batish, who she later married in 2011.

After completing her Navy service, Jenny joined the FBI and became a Special Agent in 2008. She started her career in the FBI in Philadelphia, PA, initially working in counter-terrorism and then with a newly formed “Crimes Against Children” squad focused on human trafficking cases primarily involving teenage girls. In March 2017, she was presented the inaugural Beau Biden SHIELD Award by former Vice-President and President, Joe Biden, named after his son and honoring law enforcement in the PA, NJ, and DE tristate region. This was all the more meaningful given her Dad, Dennis, went to high school and played high school football with President Biden.

Jenny and Ray welcomed their first son, Christopher in 2016 and shortly thereafter moved to Folsom, CA. Not long after moving to California, she discovered she had breast cancer, which she battled valiantly for over three years before she passed away this past November.

Jenny was a truly remarkable person who had a zest for life that was contagious. Everyone who knew Jenny adored her because when she was around, the fun increased, the laughs abounded, and the happiness flowed. She always put others first and was dedicated to service, something that she clearly learned early on from her faith-based education at Holy Cross. Even in the hardest times during her battle with cancer, she constantly asked about others and what she could do to help. She was a tremendous mom, wife, daughter, sister, and friend to many.

Remembrance:

Born and raised in Seattle's Ballard neighborhood, Roman was the second of five sons born to Martin J. Miller & Teresa E. Miller (Ford). Roman attended St. Alphonsus Catholic Elementary School and later graduated from O'Dea High School in 1944. At the age of 17, Roman enlisted in the US

Army Air Corps and helped support the Manhattan Project at the Hanford Site located just north of Richland, Washington.

After he was discharged, Roman attended Seattle University (SU) where he earned degrees in Business & Education. Once graduated, he started teaching and coaching at his alma mater (O'Dea) and spent his summers working at Longacres racetrack in Renton, Washington. He later went on to work at SU as Assistant Athletic Director working in sports publicity, recruiting and ticket sales.

Roman's passion for sports and vast social network ultimately led him to become a Professional Baseball Scout for the Houston Colt

.45's (later the Houston Astros). During this time, he still managed to continue working at several horse racetracks throughout Washington & Oregon.

Roman's friendly personality and phenomenal memory helped his social network grow and led him to assist with several political campaigns for people such as Eddie O'Brien, Dan Evans, and John Spellman. In the early 1980's Roman was appointed by Governor Spellman as the Executive Secretary of the Washington Horse Racing Commission (WHRC).

He finally retired from the WHRC in the late 1980's but continued to strongly support Catholic education & athletics at O'Dea, SU, and later at Archbishop Murphy High School located in Everett, Washington. Roman was preceded in death by his parents, and brothers Martin, James, and Francis (Frank). He is survived by his brother Louis Miller of Olympia and several nieces and nephews. A Mass of Christian Burial at St. Alphonsus Church in Ballard was held place on Thursday, June 9th, 2022.



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
